Subject: Salary Schedule Review Effective July 1, 2026

Staff Recommendation

No Action Necessary – Informational Item Only

Background

Pursuant to CalPERS and California Code of Regulations Section 570.5, salary schedule changes must be approved and adopted by the employer's governing body according to the requirements of applicable public meeting laws.

Discussion

Provided for review is a draft of the salary schedule to be effective July 1, 2026, which reflects a 3.24% increase to the salary ranges. The increases are on the change 2025 Consumer Price Index (CPI)- Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers, as prepared by the Bureau of Labor Statistics. These ranges were included in calculating the budget for FY 2026-27.

As a reminder, these adjustments are made to the salary ranges, not to the individual employee's salary. Salary changes continue to be based on the merits of the employee's annual evaluation.

This item will be brought back for consideration of adoption at the March 18, 2026, Board of Directors Meeting.

Based on Board approval, an adjustment to each salary range classification will be considered for July 1 of each year. Range adjustments are tied to changes in the Consumer Price Index - Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers for Los Angeles-Long Beach-Anaheim as prepared by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, from current year annual to the prior year annual. The adjustment to each salary range is intended to keep TVMWD's salary ranges at the market level and may not necessarily impact individual salaries. The opportunity for individual salary increases will continue under the merit-based system employed by TVMWD. An important note is that an employee's annual salary may be below the minimum salary range if: (1) their annual evaluation has not yet occurred in the current fiscal year or (2) their performance documented in prior annual evaluations has not merited an increase that has kept up with index adjustments to the salary ranges.

Shift Differential Pay

- Operators and plant assistants who work on Friday, Saturday or Sunday will be compensated with 10% additional pay for those hours.
- Shift differential pay is considered special compensation and will be reported to CalPERS as such.

On-Call Pay

- Standby operators who serve as the on-call standby operator each evening will be paid \$45 per day (\$90 on holidays).
- Lab operators who serve as the on-call plant operator each evening will be paid \$100 per day (\$200 on holidays).
- In addition to receiving the on-call pay noted above, the on-call operators will be paid for the additional time spent responding to situations.
 - If responding by phone/tablet/laptop only, the on-call operator will be guaranteed at least 15 minutes of additional pay. All time over 15 minutes will be rounded up to the nearest 15 minute increment.
 - If responding in person, the on-call operator will be guaranteed at least two hours of additional pay. All time over two hours (portal to portal) will be rounded up to the nearest 15 minute increment.
 - Operators will be eligible for OT and shift differential pay as applicable for time spent responding.
- On-call pay is not considered special compensation and thus will not be included as a part of final compensation in calculating CalPERS pension.

Holiday Pay

- Any employee scheduled who works on either the actual holiday or the observed holiday will be paid at one and one-half times the employee's regular rate of pay. Since the employee is working the holiday, the employee will also be paid an additional ten hours at regular pay for that holiday.

Staff Recommendation

No Action Necessary – Informational Item Only

Discussion

Staff will conduct a budget workshop today. Attached is the first draft of the FY 2026-2027 budget. Staff has considered the following assumptions in preparing this budget:

- This draft is based on MWD's biennial budget presented by MWD staff in February 2026 for fiscal years 2027 and 2028.
- TVMWD projected sales are based on TVMWD member agency input. Each agency provided an estimate regarding their 2026-2031 demands.
- Assumes TVMWD will maximize efficiency flows from the Miramar Plant.

Highlights of this draft budget:

Pass Through Fund

- The MWD RTS Charge is increasing by \$1,651,405 for FY 2026-2027. This is primarily due to:
 - MWD allocating more costs to the Standby Charge (\$237 million for 2027 versus \$188 million for 2026)
 - TVMWD taking proportionately more water over the last 10 years than other MWD agencies (4.92% for 2027 versus 4.75% for 2026)

The standby charge collected for the fiscal year is estimated to increase from \$35.56 to \$44.11 per EDU.

- The MWD Capacity Charge is increasing by \$89,130 for the fiscal year and by \$375,360 for the calendar year 2027. This is primarily due to an increase in the rate per cfs from 14,500 in CY 2026 to 17,900 in 2027, while the allocation basis of 110.4 cfs remains unchanged.
- MWD has introduced three new treatment fixed charges effective January 1, 2027. Half of those calendar-year charges have been allocated to the FY 2026-2027 budget, in the amount of 1,547,709.

Capital Fund

- The Capital Improvement Plan projects for FY 26-27 and for the next 5 years will be funded primarily by property tax revenues.
- While the projects for FY 26-27 will exceed the property tax revenues expected, capital reserves can be used to offset this temporary shortfall. The revenues for the 5-year period are expected to be \$17.6M, while projects are expected to be \$20.8M.

Operating Fund

- MWD's untreated water rate is increasing \$104/AF (11%). MWD's treatment surcharge is decreasing \$162/AF (-30%). These changes result in an overall decrease in the treated water rate of \$58/AF (-.04%).
- The key to keeping TVMWD rates low is maximizing the Miramar Plant. We accomplish this primarily by providing as much supply as possible to Golden State Water Company, La Verne, and Joint Water Line from TVMWD's Miramar Plant rather than MWD's Weymouth Plant.
- The controllable budget (All other Operating Fund expenses excluding water costs) increase is attributable to the following:
 - Increase in salaries and benefits due to COLA and merit increases, the addition of new positions (net 2), planned retirement leave balance payouts, and increased retiree medical costs.
 - An increased volume of Planning and Resources studies.
 - Cyclical Board election costs.

TVMWD Surcharge

- The current TVMWD surcharge for 2026 is \$32. Staff proposes a TVMWD surcharge for 2027 at \$40.

TVMWD Fixed Charges

- TVMWD's current fixed charges are 10% of the controllable budget cost. TVMWD can meet the required revenue to cover costs and replenish reserves by fixed cost allocation revenue.

Reserves

The overall Board-designated reserves minimum level is \$10.9M for FY 25-26. We currently expect to finish at \$11.2M by the end of FY 25-26. The proposed budget provides a framework to maintain minimum funding reserve levels through FY 2027. However, the Board-adopted *General Manager's Workplan* calls for funding of reserves to be at target levels by the end of FY 2030, which would require further rate increases beyond those presented in the draft budget.

Summary

Based on this first draft of the budget, TVMWD expects to require a surcharge of \$40 per acre foot in addition to the MWD rate for 2027.

This item will be discussed with TVMWD's member agency managers on March 11th and brought back for further board discussion in April 2026.

Fiscal Impact

The preliminary draft budget reflects total projected revenues of approximately \$97.0 million and total proposed appropriations of approximately \$95.5 million. The draft currently reflects a projected surplus of \$1.5 million. These amounts are subject to change as revenue projections, expenditure estimates, and policy direction are refined prior to formal budget adoption.



The San Gabriel Valley Economic Partnership (SGVEP) is a regional, membership-based organization dedicated to advancing economic vitality, job creation, and public policy advocacy throughout the San Gabriel Valley. Discussion

After a relatively slow start to the year, activities in the Legislature will begin moving at a more rapid pace now that the bill introduction deadline has passed in this the second year of the 2025-2026 Legislative Session. Hard to believe that the Spring recess is already coming up later this month.

As anticipated, legislators waited until the last minute to make final decisions on the package of bills they introduced, respectively. Staff is currently in the process of reviewing all newly introduced bills which may affect TVMWD, as can be seen in the initial “legislative status report” (LSR) following this memo.

Over this past month, staff spent quite a bit of time at the Capitol for the following events:

- ACWA’s annual Legislative Symposium
- CSDA’s initial Legislative Committee Meeting for the year
- SGVEP’s annual Capitol Day meeting with SGV legislators
- TVMWD’s annual Lobby Day meeting with our seven (7) Assembly/Senate members

Additionally, staff had the opportunity to join a select group of CSDA special districts for a meeting at Assembly Michelle Rodriguez’ district office and Three Valleys will be hosting her district staff for a briefing and tour of Miramar next week. Finally, staff will be participating in the annual CSDA Special District Legislative Days conference at the Capitol in early April and

the following week we will be joined by our state lobbyist for a legislative update at our April 15 board meeting.

Summary: The Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024, approved by the voters as Proposition 4 at the November 5, 2024, statewide general election, authorized the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$10,000,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, drought, flood, and water resilience, wildfire and forest resilience, coastal resilience, extreme heat mitigation, biodiversity and nature-based climate solutions, climate-smart, sustainable, and resilient farms, ranches, and working lands, park creation and outdoor access, and clean air programs. Current law authorizes certain regulations needed to effectuate or implement programs of the act to be adopted as emergency regulations in accordance with the Administrative Procedure Act, as provided. Current law requires the emergency regulations to be filed with the Office of Administrative Law and requires the emergency regulations to remain in effect until repealed or amended by the adopting state agency. This bill, notwithstanding the above, would exempt the adoption of regulations needed to effectuate or implement programs of the act from the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, as provided. The bill would require a state entity that receives funding to administer a competitive grant program established using the Administrative Procedure Act exemption to do certain things, including develop draft project solicitation and evaluation guidelines and to submit those guidelines to the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency, except as provided. The bill would require the Secretary of the Natural Resources Agency to post an electronic form of the guidelines submitted by a state entity and the subsequent verifications on the Natural Resources Agency's internet website. Current law requires electrical corporations to annually prepare and submit wildfire mitigation plans to the Office of Energy Infrastructure Safety for review and approval. This bill would require the commission, on or before January 1, 2027, 2028, to update a general order to require each electrical corporation to remove all permanently abandoned transmission facilities, as specified. This bill would require that an electrical corporation's wildfire mitigation plan also include an accounting of all transmission facilities, including permanently abandoned transmission facilities, and include a plan for how and when each permanently abandoned transmission facility will be removed and the wildfire mitigation measures that are being implemented to prevent hazards, as provided. Summary: The Municipal Water District Law of 1911 provides for the formation of municipal water districts and grants to those districts specified powers. Current law permits a district to acquire, control, distribute, store, spread, sink, treat, purify, recycle, recapture, and salvage any water for the beneficial use of the district, its inhabitants, or the owners of rights to water in the district. Current law, upon the request of certain Indian tribes and the satisfaction of certain conditions, requires a district to provide service of water at substantially the same terms applicable to the customers of the district to the Indian tribe's lands that are not within a district, as prescribed. Current law also authorizes a district, until January 1, 2027, under specified circumstances, to apply to the applicable local agency formation commission to provide this service of water to Indian lands, as defined, that are not within the district and requires the local agency formation commission to approve that application. This bill would extend the above provisions regarding the application to the applicable local agency formation commission to January 1, 2032. (Based on 01/26/2026 text)

Summary: Current law establishes the Safe and Affordable Drinking Water Fund in the State Treasury to help water systems provide an adequate and affordable supply of safe drinking water in both the near and long terms. Current law requires the State Water Resources Control Board to annually adopt a fund expenditure plan, as provided, and requires expenditures from the fund to be consistent with the fund expenditure plan. Current law requires the state board to base the fund expenditure plan on data and analysis drawn from a specified drinking water needs assessment. This bill would require the board to, on or before May 1, 2027, and on or before May 1 of each year thereafter, develop a drinking water needs assessment, as specified. The bill would require the assessment to include an analysis of the funds necessary to make water service affordable for customers of

community water systems with fewer than 3,000 service connections and would require this analysis to be updated at least every 3 years. (Based on 02/17/2026 text)

Summary: Current law prohibits the use of potable water for the irrigation of nonfunctional turf located on commercial, industrial, and institutional properties, other than a cemetery, and on properties of homeowners' associations, common interest developments, and community service organizations or similar entities, as specified. Current law requires a person or entity to be subject to civil liability or penalties by the State Water Resources Control Board, as prescribed, or to civil liability and penalties imposed by an urban water supplier, pursuant to a locally adopted ordinance or policy. Current law authorizes a public water system, city, county, or city and county to enforce the provisions relating to the prohibition, as specified. This bill would require a person or entity to be subject to civil liability or penalties imposed by a special district with water conservation enforcement authority pursuant to a locally adopted ordinance or policy. Summary: The California Emergency Services Act requires all public water systems, as defined, with 10,000 or more service connections to review and revise their disaster preparedness plans in conjunction with related agencies, including, but not limited to, local fire departments and the Office of Emergency Services to ensure that the plans are sufficient to address possible disaster scenarios. A person, as defined, who violates the provisions of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill, beginning January 1, 2028, would require all urban retail water suppliers, as defined, serving a high or very high fire hazard severity zone to include incident-specified response procedures for wildfires as part of their disaster preparedness plans, including any applicable emergency response plan as required by federal law. The bill would require these plans to include mitigation actions, including actions, procedures, and equipment, that can obviate or significantly lessen the impact of a wildfire on the water system and the supply of drinking water provided by the water supplier. Because violation of these requirements by certain urban retail water suppliers would constitute a misdemeanor, the bill would expand the scope of a crime, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program. Summary: The California Safe Drinking Water Act provides for the operation of public water systems and imposes on the State Water Resources Control Board various duties and responsibilities for the regulation and control of drinking water in the state. This bill would authorize the state board to fund projects, upon the appropriation of funds by the Legislature, through grants or loans to public water systems to address perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances in drinking water or source water. The bill would prescribe sources from which those funds may originate and permissible activities for those projects. The bill would authorize the state board to implement the bill through a policy handbook or workplan exempt from the rulemaking provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act. This bill contains other existing laws. (Based on 02/20/2026 text)

Summary: Existing law, the California Emergency Services Act, requires all public water systems, as defined, with 10,000 or more service connections to review and revise their disaster preparedness plans in conjunction with related agencies, including, but not limited to, local fire departments and the Office of Emergency Services, to ensure that the plans are sufficient to address possible disaster scenarios. A person, as defined, who violates the provisions of this act is guilty of a misdemeanor. This bill would require a disaster-impacted public water system, as defined, to conduct a disaster impact assessment within 6 months of a disaster, in coordination with the disaster-impacted county, as defined, before receiving state funding. The bill would require the assessment to include specified components, including determining whether the best interest of the affected residences, as defined, requires becoming a consolidated water system in order to ensure access to quality water and adequate supply, as provided. The bill would require the assessment to be provided to the State Water Resources Control Board. The bill would require a disaster-impacted public water system, in coordination with the disaster-impacted county, to adopt specified requirements into its assessment process, including making the coordinating bodies subject to the California Public Records Act, providing the opportunity for public comment, and arranging for live translations, as provided. Because a violation of these requirements by certain public water systems would constitute a misdemeanor, the bill would expand the scope of a crime, thereby imposing a state-mandated local program. This bill contains other related provisions and other existing laws. (Based on 02/20/2026 text)
