7.A ACWA/JPIA

Mr. Andy Sells, CEO and Ms. Karen Thesing, Director of Insurance Services were in attendance to present TVMWD with its refund check for low loss claims history during CY 2016. The total award was \$52,027. Directors and staff were commended in their efforts in controlling TVMWD risks and their use of available resources which combined result in a discounted rate as well as the refund.

8.A - Administration

8.A.1 – Resolution No. 17-03-794 Concurring in Nomination of Fred Adjarian to the Executive Committee of the Association of California Water Agencies Joint Insurance Authority (ACWA/JPIA)

The Board was asked to consider the request to concur in nomination of Mr. Fred Adjarian, El Toro Water District, to the ACWA/JPIA Executive Committee and to direct staff to forward the approved resolution.

8.A - Engineering-Operations

8.B.1 - Miramar Water Treatment Plant Shutdown Summary

The Board was provided an update of the annual Miramar Plant Maintenance Shutdown that occurred February 6-10, 2017 and responded to questions thereof. A PowerPoint presentation illustrating the work was shared and is available upon request. Mr. Lang recognized his two supervisors, Dominique Aguiar and Freeman Ensign for the coordination efforts in this annual process.

8.C - Finance-Personnel

8.C.1 – LeRoy's Connection Replacement – Budget Amendment (Project No. 58154)

The proposal is to move \$200,000 from the PM 24 Connection Modification Project, and setting it aside for the connection replacement at LeRoy Haynes Center. It was noted that MWD has indicated they are reconsidering their position on turndown percentage for meters due to newer technologies. This information item will be returned for consideration of approval at the March 15, 2017 meeting. A notice inviting bids for this project will be initiated later this month and be returned to the Board in April for consideration and award.

8.C.2 - Return Unexpended Funds to Capital Asset Reserve - Budget Amendment

The proposal is to return unexpended funds in the amount of \$503,535 to capital asset reserves. These funds are derived from projects with encumbered funds that are either completed or not planned to move forward. Moving funds at this time provides a more complete picture of Board designated funds available to meet individual reserve goal amounts, along with the overall emergency reserve goal of \$10 million. This information item will be returned for consideration of approval at the March 15, 2017 meeting.

8.C.3 - FY 17-18 Annual Purchase Orders

Each year the Board is asked to approve annual purchases orders where general purchases exceed \$50,000. The staff report included the list of vendors that fall under this consideration. There were no new vendors included for FY 17-18. This information item will be returned for consideration of approval at the March 15, 2017 meeting.

8.C.4 - FY 2017-18 TVMWD Budget Draft 1.0

The Board was provided a Budget workshop for FY 2017-18 TVMWD Budget Draft 1.0. Several assumptions are considered in preparing the budget such as:

- MWD's Ten-Year Financial Forecast
- Potential Changes to MWD's treatment surcharge (this is not included in the budget and rates presented today), and is subject to additional information provided during the March MWD Board/Committee meetings.
- Sales estimates based upon TVMWD member agency input.

Staff highlighted the various expense and revenue funds that comprise this budget based upon known costs and reasonable estimates:

<u>Pass-through</u>: this category considers standby and readiness to serve charges, capacity charges and fixed charges. The FY 17-18 standby charge is proposed to decrease slightly by approximately \$300,000, or \$18.53/EDU, which reduces costs for noticing and eliminates one public meeting. The CY 2018 Capacity Charge is expected to decrease by approximately \$100,000. This reduction is a direct result of member

agencies working with TVMWD to reduce the peak flow during the critical summer months.

<u>Capital</u>: projects were outlined in the recently adopted strategic plan, with enhancing local groundwater production as a priority. Capital Investment Program is budgeted at \$1.4 M and Capital Repair and Replacement at \$578K.

Operating: Includes all daily operating expenses, salary, compensation, benefits, reserve replenishment and taxes.

A detail for each of these categories was included in the staff report that is available upon request.

The Board was briefed on the budget related to Director Compensation and Benefits. TVMWD last increased their budget in this area approximately ten years ago. While each director is eligible to spend up to a certain amount annually, the budget is based upon past attendance/spending practices versus eligible spending. For FY 17-18 this line item will be increased slightly in line with actual spending.

The Board was briefed on actual reserves categories as of January 31, 2017 and the proposed FY 17-18 reserve replenishment recommendations.

The Board was briefed on operating revenues, the primary sources that include: hydroelectric income, interest income, notes receivable and cell tower lease income and fixed charges.

The total proposed CY 2018 TVMWD rate is \$1,015/AF for treated water and \$695/AF for untreated water. While controllable costs are increasing slightly, increased demands on the Miramar Treatment Plant will result in the \$8/AF surcharge reducing to a \$0 surcharge for water purchased from Miramar.

The proposed budget will be presented to the member agencies for feedback. Any modifications will be shared with the Board during the first meeting in April with a proposal to adopt at the April 19, 2017 meeting.

Upon motion and second the floor was opened for discussion. There being no further discussion, Vice President De Jesus called for the vote.

Motion No. 17-03-5127 to approve the March 15, 2017 Consent Calendar items 7.1-7.5. The motion passed with a 6-0 vote. Director Kuhn had an excused absence from the meeting.

8. General Manager's Report

8.A - Administration

8.A.1 Legislative Update, March 2017

Assistant General Manager, Kirk Howie provided the Board with a legislative report as follows:

The Board was provided with a comprehensive Legislative Status Report which listed activity on the bills TVMWD is watching. As the legislative cycle proceeds some of these items may change from watch to support or oppose.

Staff provided an updated on SB 231 (Hertzberg) that is generating interest within the water industry. The bill was discussed during the recent MWD Legislative Committee with an initial support position being taken by MWD. Following feedback from its member agencies, MWD has stepped back to a watch position on this bill. Both ACWA and CSDA continue to watch this bill. SB 231 has been assigned to the Senate and Governance Committee. The primary concerns with this proposed bill have to do with MS4 permitting and fees and other Proposition 218 issues thereof. Should this legislation pass it is anticipated it will result in significant fees to agencies, as well as individual and business property owners.

Director Mendoza inquired about a bill introduced by Senator Leyva SB 427 (Public water systems: lead user service lines). He also inquired about another bill SB 252 (Water wells: permits — critically overdrafted groundwater basins). Mr. Howie advised he will look into both of these bills and provide an update during the next reporting cycle. The Board was provided information regarding a coalition letter TVMWD participated in supporting the California Water Fix.

8.A.2 Approve Director Expense Reports for February 2017

The Board was asked to approve February 2017 expense reports. Upon motion and second the floor was opened for discussion. There being no discussion, President De Jesus called for the vote.

Moved: Ruzicka; Second: Bowcock Motion No. 17-03-5128 to approve payment of the Director Expense reports for February 2017. The motion passed with a 6-0 vote. Director Kuhn had an excused absence from the meeting.

8.A.3 Addition to Agenda

Director Bowcock made a request for the Board to consider an addition to the agenda concerning an increase to director travel expenses.

Upon motion and second the floor was opened for discussion. Discussion occurred whether there was time to wait until the next agenda to address this or whether action was necessary at today's meeting. Mr. Hansen noted there is a level of urgency regarding this item if action was not taken today. Legal counsel indicated that there appears to be justification to take action on this matter today. The floor was opened for public comment regarding this item. There was no comment from the audience present.

Vice President De Jesus called for a vote to add this item to the agenda.

Moved: Ruzicka; Second: Goytia

Motion No. 17-03-5129 to consider addition to agenda regarding an increase to director travel expenses. The motion passed with a 6-0 vote. Director Kuhn had an excused absence from the meeting.

8.A.3 Increase to FY 16-17 travel budget for District 3

Director Bowcock noted that as of this date he has exceeded his allocated \$6,000 travel expense budget through his representation at events on behalf of TVMWD, As a result he will be unable to participate in upcoming ACWA-JPIA events where he is the representative for TVMWD. Director Bowcock is assigned as the representative of the District for ACWA-JPIA and serves on the Region 8 Board of Directors. Early registration for the event will end prior to the next meeting resulting in a savings to TVMWD. Director Bowcock is seeking consideration for an additional \$1,000 to be added to his travel budget.

Upon motion and second the floor was opened for discussion. There being none, Vice President De Jesus called for the vote.

Moved: Ruzicka; Second: Goytia

Motion No. 17-03-5130 to authorize an addition of \$1,000 to the travel budget for District 3 for FY 16-17. The motion passed with a 6-0 vote. Director Kuhn had an excused absence from the meeting.

8.B - Engineering and Operations

8.B.1 Calendar Year Imported Water Purchases, February 2017

Manager of Operations and Engineering Mario Garcia presented the report. Through the end of February slightly under 5,000/AF of Tier 1 water has been sold. TVMWD is trending as usual based upon its three year comparison.

Mr. Hansen requested an update on the amount of water that MWD may make available for spreading.

Vice President De Jesus provided an update from the recent MWD Board meetings regarding this matter.

- Preliminary information indicates MWD may authorize up to 1 M/AF for this purpose.
- Lake Mead has increased in capacity by 60', approximately 6-7 M/AF stored at this facility.
- MWD is hoping to be authorized for Article 21 water up to 200/AF to be spread into multiple basins.
- MWD is reviewing opportunities for cyclic storage water in the Main Basin.

8.B.3 Miramar Operations Report – February 2017

Water Operations Manager, Steve Lang provided an overview of the Miramar Plant operations and activities for the month of February 2017. Water quality continues to meet or exceed state and federal drinking water standards without any violations reported by SWRCB. There is a slight increase in organics coming into Lake Silverwood from the State Water Project. TVMWD is still within the MCLs on all constituents.

The production and sales statistics were reviewed with a notation that the lower amounts were attributed to many factors such as weather, maintenance shutdown, a mechanical issue at the Joint Water Line, and Well #1 being offline. Current production/sales data month and year-to-date were reviewed as follows: total potable water produced 370.3/AF; Well #1 ran for a total of 2 days; Well #2 was online for 27 days. Well #1 has now been repaired and returned to service. Combined, both wells produced a total of 57.2/AF produced; total potable water sales for the month were 427.5/AF; total year-to-date potable water sold is at 120.4% of what was budgeted.

Hydroelectric generation data was much lower than usual and is attributed to the low production issues described above.

There was one unplanned power outage on February 22, 2017. Special activities were also reviewed. The full report is available upon request.

9. Directors' / General Managers Oral Reports

9.A Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO)

Director Ruzicka reported on the March 8, 2017 meeting. The newly elected supervisors have been a good fit and are quickly getting up-to-date.

9.B PWR Joint Water Line

Director Horan reported on the February 16, 2017 meeting. During this meeting the new Commissioner from City of Pomona, Council Member Ginna Escobar was seated. Pomona's alternate Commissioner, Council Member Rubio Gonzales was also in attendance. The annual rotation of officers occurred. Scarlett Kwong, Walnut Valley Water District is the President and Anthony Lima, Rowland Water District is Vice President. Commission staff provided an overview of a leak that developed at a valve on the Joint Water Line going through the Cal Poly campus. A pipe spool was temporarily installed in place of the valve to get the line back in operation as quickly as possible.

9.C Six Basins Watermaster

Director Bowcock reported the next regular meeting of Six Basins Watermaster Board will be March 22, 2017. Work is continuing on the 6BWM Master Plan. Mr. Andy Malone has been invited to present to the Board at the April 5, 2017 meeting.

9.D Main San Gabriel Basin Watermaster

Director Bowcock reported that the Key Well was at 181.7' compared to the all time low of 172.2'. He also reported on the status of the three reservoirs in the Main Basin, Cogswell, Morris Dam and San Gabriel Valley. Combined, the capacity these reservoirs can store is 83,478 AF; the capacity is currently at 57% or 47,000/AF of water. Each foot of capacity in the Key Well represents 8.000/AF.

9.E Chino Basin Watermaster

Vice President De Jesus reported a special board meeting was held on March 3, 2017 to review the judge's orders regarding the safe yield and how to proceed. The safe yield reset is still under discussion, along with storage and land use conversion. The court hearing on the safe yield reset is scheduled for the end of April.

9.F MWD Board

Director De Jesus reported on recent action taken at the March 14, 2017 board meeting. It was reported that water sales are down by 42,000/AF in the current budget year, or approximately 100,000/AF on a five year average. Diamond Valley Lake capacity is at approximately 80%. Two new directors from Central Basin MWD were seated, William Gedney and Leticia Vasquez-Wilson; Director Mark Gold from the City of Los Angeles was reappointed. A study/third party cost analysis was completed on the California Water Fix. The estimated cost is projected to be approximately \$14 B.

9.G Additional Board Member or Staff Reports / Comments

Director Mendoza reported on a meeting he attended with Assembly Member Freddie Rodriguez where an update was provided on the recent spillover at Oroville. A committee is being formed to investigate probable causes and effects. He also commented on a meeting that he and Director Ruzicka attended with Representative Grace Napolitano with updates on the stormwater issues. A white paper has been provided to Kirk and will be distributed to all Directors.

Director Goytia extended thanks to Kirk and Dominique for the recent tour provided to Pomona Council Member Robert Torres. Council Member Rubio Gonzalez is also interested in a future tour. He commented that a program was aired this past week by National Geographic on water and power. Director Goytia attended a community coffee held by Assembly Member Freddie Rodriguez and had the privilege to address questions on water from the audience. Pomona Mayor Sandoval has released a schedule of community meetings and Director Goytia has been invited to join and address water issues.

Director Bowcock brought up observations from the recent Diamond Valley Lake inspection tour. The cutbacks at Lake Skinner are very obvious. The tour visited the solar panels at Lake Skinner and also visited the Santa Rosa Plateau. There were many attendees from both the University Club and Active Claremont. He is

working with University Club member Michael Fay to coordinate a tour of local water facilities. He will also invite participation from Active Claremont and new members of WEWAC. Director Bowcock reported on the recent ACWA Region 8 meeting. Steve Blois was chosen to fill the vacancy on this Board.

Mr. Hansen noted that the March 14, 2017 MWD Board Meeting, Director and Vice Chair David De Jesus received his 15 year service pin. From a seniority perspective Director De Jesus is currently at #4 and will move up to #3 soon with a upcoming planned retirement. Today more than half of the 38 MWD Board Members have fewer than three years of service. A list of the current MWD Directors and their corresponding years of service was provided. Director De Jesus expressed his thanks for the continued support from the TVMWD Board.

Mr. Kennedy commented briefly on the March 2, 2017 Supreme Court ruling regarding the California Public Records Act (CPRA) citing that emails and written materials on any personal devices are now subject to the CPRA. A future workshop will be developed in the coming months to address how this impacts TVMWD. In order to avoid any confusion between personal and TVMWD related business all were encouraged to use their TVMWD email address for all District business rather than a personal email address.

Mr. Hansen requested that all Directors turn in their gate openers for some updates.

10. Future Agenda Items

There were no requests for future agenda items.

11. Adjournment

Vice President De Jesus adjourned the meeting at 9:18 a.m. <u>The next regular</u> Board meeting is scheduled for April 5, 2017 at 8:00 a.m.

Discussion:

The Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) has adopted a policy statement urging the State Water Resources Control Board to set aside its problematic "unimpaired flow" approach to setting new water quality objectives in the Bay-Delta.

The statement calls on the State Water Board to heed Governor Brown's call for negotiated agreements, which have proven successful in achieving positive ecological outcomes while maintaining water supply reliability. ACWA believes the state's policy on flows should embrace a collaborative, comprehensive approach that protects and promotes both water supply reliability and ecosystem health.

The State Water Board staff proposal to base new water quality objectives on a "percentage of unimpaired flow" could lead to widespread fallowing of agricultural land and negatively affect water reliability for much of the state's population. The singular focus on unimpaired flow is incompatible with the state's policy of coequal goals and other broader policy commitments in the Brown Administration's California Water Action Plan. ACWA is calling on its member agencies to adopt a resolution in support of its policy statement on Bay-Delta flow requirements. A draft resolution is attached for Board consideration.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THREE VALLEYS MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT IN SUPPORT OF THE ASSOCIATION OF CALIFORNIA WATER AGENCIES POLICY STATEMENT ON BAY-DELTA FLOW REQUIREMENTS

WHEREAS, California is facing a defining moment in water policy that will be substantially impacted by the State Water Resources Control Board's approach to water quality objectives under the Water Quality Control Plan for the San Francisco Bay/Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta; and

WHEREAS, the State Water Board has the responsibility for updating the Bay-Delta Plan in a manner that establishes water quality objectives that ensure the reasonable protection of all beneficial uses of water in a way that is consistent with the coequal goals of improving water supply reliability and protecting, restoring and enhancing the Delta ecosystem and with respect to the commitments made in the California Water Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, the State Water Board staff's current proposal, which focuses singularly on an "unimpaired flow" approach, is irreconcilable with a policy of coequal goals of improving both water supply reliability and ecosystem health; it is also inconsistent with the broader water policy objectives of the Brown Administration; and

WHEREAS, the ACWA Board of Directors has unanimously adopted a strong policy statement calling for a better approach that can more effectively achieve ecological objectives while maintaining water supply reliability. The statement calls on the State Water Board to set aside its "unimpaired flow" approach and heed Governor Jerry Brown's call for negotiated agreements, which have been successful on many rivers and tributaries in California.

WHEREAS, the ACWA statement notes that to be successful, the state's flow policy must be consistent with the principles of collaboration, comprehensive solutions, science, functional flows, economic considerations, consistency with state policy, and leadership; and

WHEREAS, California's local urban and agricultural water managers are united in their vision for a future that includes a vibrant California economy as well as healthy ecosystems and fish populations, and believe that vision is best achieved through a comprehensive, collaborative approaches;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of Three Valleys Municipal Water District hereby supports ACWA's Policy Statement on Bay-Delta Flows and encourages the State Water Resources Control Board to embrace the approach articulated in ACWA's policy statement.

Discussion:

The Board will review and consider *Exhibit A*, itemizing a list of TVMWD property to be declared as surplus. The Board will also consider authorizing the General Manager to dispose of the property in accordance with the procedures outlined in Resolution No. 11-04-488; a summary of these procedures are summarized below.

Resolution No. 11-04-488 requires the General Manager to describe the property, determine the dollar value, and select the method of disposal which will generate the best return for TVMWD, including, giving first priority to our Member Agencies to purchase the property, public auction, public sale, or selected bidders. Property not sold or without resale value may be disposed of in the most efficient manner, including donations to Member Agencies, recognized charities, local government entities, non-profit agencies whose activities are related to health, education, and/or the public welfare.

2000 Ford Ranger

The surplus property list includes one (1) TVMWD vehicle that the District has owned since 1999. The truck works, but is of limited value for daily use due to its limited seating capacity and small truck bed. It is now very seldom used which puts more stress on the vehicle. The value was determined based on an average between selling the vehicle 'as is' via private party sales and being used as a trade in vehicle. The 2000 Ford Ranger has low miles (less than 46,000) and is fully equipped with an automatic transmission, 3.0 V6 engine, radio/cassette, cloth seats, bed liner and sliding rear

window. The vehicle maintenance records indicate regular maintenance has occurred throughout its history. This value estimate is provided as an average at \$3,200.

Any TVMWD Member Agency interested in purchasing this property for public agency use, at the price noted above, must notify the General Manager in writing via email no later than **Tuesday**, **May 9**, **2017 by 4:00 p.m.** The first offer at full price received in writing at rhansen@tvmwd.com will be notified of the successful sale.

If no offers are received from any Member Agency, the property will be offered for public auction to maximize the District's financial recovery. Individuals may participate in the auction at that time. The truck will be advertised in a local newspaper, and sealed bids will be accepted for a period of ten (10) working days after the initial ad begins circulation. The highest bid will be accepted and the vehicle sold to that party. Bids will be publicly opened on a day set based on the advertising/bid schedule; the date of which will be included in the advertisement. The advertisement will be circulated to the Member Agencies via email as well.

Purchase of this vehicle will be an "as is" sale. The vehicle's California exempt license plates will be retired and the new buyer will be required to register the vehicle.

Kitchen Appliances

The break room remodel necessitates replacement of some of the smaller appliances that will no longer serve the needs of the District.

Hotpoint 30" electric range. Range works, but is in need of a thorough cleaning.

Samsung 23.5" dishwasher. Dishwasher works, may need some cleaning and new seals/gaskets for new installation.

Legislative Status Report As of March 2017

Summary

The California Constitution requires that the water resources of the state be put to beneficial use to the fullest extent of which they are capable and that the waste or unreasonable use or unreasonable method of use of water be prevented. This measure would declare the intent of the Legislature to amend the California Constitution to provide a program that would ensure that affordable water is available to all Californians and to ensure that water conservation is given a permanent role in California's future.

A resolution to propose to the people of the State of California an amendment to the Constitution of the State, by adding Article XC thereto, relating to water.



2016 ATTITUDES & AWARENESS SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

In December 2016, the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California conducted regional survey to understand the general public's attitudes and awareness of Metropolitan and current water issues. The survey was conducted in English and Spanish and was based on a similar survey conducted in 2015.

METHODOLOGY

1,000 phone interviews (landline + cell) of residents within MWD's service area. Overall margin of error \pm 3.1 percentage points

HIGHLIGHTS

Favorable Rating of MWD: Similar to 2015, 73% of respondents have a favorable rating of Metropolitan after hearing a statement of what the district does. Two-thirds of respondents in San Diego and Ventura Counties had a positive brand rating for Metropolitan and close to three-quarters of respondents in LA, Orange and Inland Empire rated Metropolitan positive.

Attributes: Ratings on key attributes remain high. 52% agree that Metropolitan cares about the environment and is effectively managing the region's current water needs. 46% agree Metropolitan is an agency they trust.

Reliable Water Supply: 47% agree that Southern California has a reliable water supply, consistent with 2015. Hispanic (57%) and African American (61%) ratings are higher than Asian (44%) and White (41%).

Planning for Future Water Needs: Infrastructure improvements are generally supported: water storage (84%), imported water delivery systems (81%), regional stormwater (75%), and seawater desalination (74%)

Climate Change Attitudes: 82% are very concerned about the impacts of climate change. 77% support investing to address potential impacts.

Commitment to Conserve Water: There was a slight decrease in the commitment to conserve water, from 88% in 2015 to 83% in 2016. 88% believe they have conserved as much as they can. 62% support instituting mandatory water conservation requirements on all customers.

Conservation Advertising: 72% recall seeing advertisements on conservation, a slight decrease from 2015 (88%). Billboards, TV, and radio are the most common.

Recycled Water Attitudes: 60% overall support use of purified recycled water for drinking water purposes: Asian (74%), Hispanic (64%), White (62%), and African American (54%).

Requested Action:

The Board will receive and review the bids for the Leroy's Meter Connection Project (Project No. 58154), authorize the General Manager to award the construction contract to CP Construction, and enter into an agreement with said contractor for the amount of \$136,030.

Discussion:

As part of its continuing assessment of the Miramar infrastructure, staff proposes a project to relocate the existing pipeline of the Leroy's connection. The facility is located along Baseline Road adjacent to the Leroy-Haynes School in La Verne. The vault for the connection is deep and the exposed portions of the pipe are exhibiting signs of corrosion. Relocating the pipe will improve safety associated with a deep vault and allow the District to replace deteriorating sections of pipe. Additionally, the SCADA cabinet and controls will be replaced with an improved layout that can be replicated at other locations.

TVMWD issued a Notice Inviting Bids on March 6, 2017 for this project. A mandatory pre-bid meeting was held on March 14, 2017 and bids were opened on March 27, 2017. The bids are listed in Table 1 below:

Staff reviewed all bids and checked the submittal of the apparent low bidder, CP Construction. CP Construction's bid submittal was responsive to TVMWD's requirements, its financial condition was deemed to be acceptable, and reference checks for prior completed projects yielded positive feedback. TVMWD has worked with CP Construction in the past and is confident that it will be able to complete the project successfully.

Prior to the start of construction, TVMWD will reach out to the City of La Verne, Los Angeles County, Leroy-Haynes School and area residents to inform them of the planned work and to coordinate activities so as to minimize any impacts of the actual construction activities.

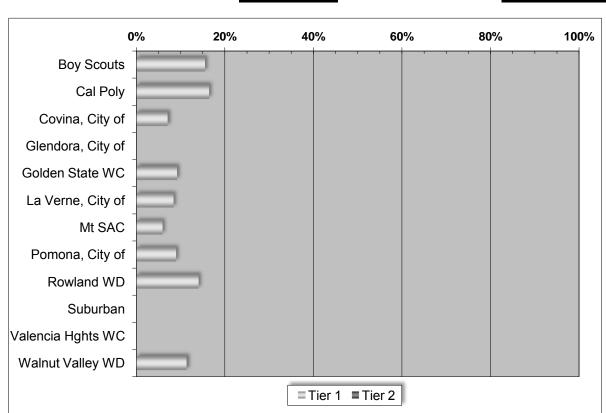

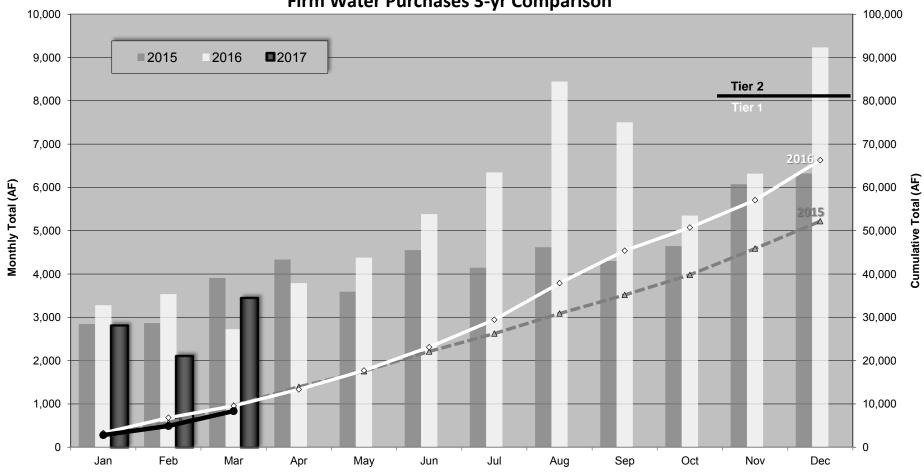

Discussion:

Attached for review is the rate resolution reflecting the rates and charges that will go into effect January 1, 2018. Based on the assumptions for TVMWD FY 17-18 Budget 1.2, TVMWD will apply a surcharge discount of -\$5 per AF to treated water delivered during calendar year 2018.

TVMWD will apply a \$0 surcharge to all untreated water delivered during calendar year 2018. As clarified beginning with the 2017 rate resolution, untreated water delivered may be subject to additional charges from other agencies based on the connection used and basin delivered to.

Also attached are the summary drafts of the capacity charge and fixed charge for 2018. The rate resolution and these summaries have been revised to reflect the addition of the following:

- North Azusa Connection Covina Irrigating Company
- Pomello Connection Pomona

RESOLUTION NO. 17-04-797

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THREE VALLEYS MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT ADOPTING WATER RATES FOR CALENDAR YEAR 2018

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Three Valleys Municipal Water District ("TVMWD") finds as follows:

- A. TVMWD is a municipal water district organized and operating pursuant to Water Code Section 71000 et seq., and is a Member Agency of the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MWD") which wholesales imported water to TVMWD;
- B. TVMWD is responsible for the sale and distribution of the water it purchases from MWD, and is authorized under Water Code Sections 71611-71613 to sell any water within its control to consumers, cities, and other public agencies and corporations;
- C. Under Water Code Sections 71613-71617, TVMWD is authorized to fix rates at which the water it delivers may be sold;
- D. TVMWD has approved the Fiscal Year (FY) Budget for 2017-18 consisting of expenses for expected water sales, reserves, and the Miramar Water Treatment Plant ("Miramar");
- E. TVMWD intends to collect sufficient revenues to cover the projected expenses from miscellaneous revenue, state subventions, property taxes, and by rate-based fees and charges for delivered and/or stored water;
- F. The revenues raised by the levying of TVMWD's water rates are used for all the purposes authorized by law, including but not limited to (1) funding the operating costs of TVMWD, including employee wages and benefits; (2) purchasing or leasing supplies, equipment, and materials; (3) meeting financial reserve needs and requirements; (4) obtaining funds for capital projects necessary to maintain service within existing services areas; (5) providing for repairs, maintenance, and depreciation of works owned and operated by TVMWD; (6) yielding a reasonable surplus for improvements, extensions, and enlargements; and (7) paying the principal, interest and maintaining the required coverage on any bonded indebtedness;
- G. The establishment, modification, structuring, restructuring, and approval of TVMWD's water rates are for the purpose of meeting TVMWD's operating expenses (including employee wages and benefits), purchasing and/or leasing supplies, equipment, and materials, meeting TVMWD's financial reserve needs and requirements, and obtaining funds for capital projects necessary to maintain service within TVMWD's existing service areas, and is therefore exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act as provided by Public Resources Code Section 21080(b)(8);
- H. The amount of the rates and charges hereby adopted do not exceed the reasonable anticipated costs for the corresponding services provided by TVMWD, and therefore the fees imposed hereby do not qualify as a "tax" under Article XIIIC, Section 1(e), of the California Constitution or Section 50076 of the California Government Code, and the

actions taken herein are exempt from the additional notice and public meeting requirements of the Ralph M. Brown Act pursuant to Government Code Sections 54954.6(a)(1)(A) and (B); and

I. To the extent that the water rates hereby adopted apply to TVMWD's provision of wholesale water service to its retail agencies, such rates are not imposed upon any person as an incident of property ownership, and thus are not subject to the substantive and procedural prerequisites of Article XIIID of the California Constitution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that TVMWD's Board of Directors ("Board") does hereby adopt and order as follows:

- 1. Effective Date. The effective date of the following rates, fees and charges shall be January 1, 2018 unless otherwise noted. The rates shall remain in effect until changed or canceled by the Board.
- 2. Rates. All sales, deliveries, and availability of water at the rates established herein shall be subject to the ability of TVMWD to sell, deliver, and make available such water under operating conditions determined by the General Manager of TVMWD and of MWD, and subject to the water service agreements of TVMWD and of MWD.
 - **A. TVMWD Water Rates**. MWD has assigned a "base firm demand" or allocation of water deliveries to TVMWD for the period January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2024 based on Option 2 of the new 10-year purchase order agreement. A Tier 1 base firm demand of 80,688 acre feet has been allocated to the TVMWD Member Agencies based on the proportional share of each Member Agency's 10-year average (FY 2005 through FY 2014); however, no agency will receive less than their CY 2014 Tier 1 limit. The Tier 1 allocations for calendar year 2018 are as follows:

Each Member Agency's allocation may change if TVMWD's base firm demand is changed, but the sum of the Tier 1 allocations shall remain the same as the base firm demand assigned to TVMWD by MWD. If TVMWD's base firm demand is changed, the Member Agency Tier 1 allocation will change in proportion to the amount the agency contributed to the change and in comparison to the total increase in TVMWD's base firm demand.

Effective January 1, 2018 treated water from TVMWD will be sold at \$1,010 per acre foot for Tier 1 and \$1,096 per acre foot for Tier 2.

Individual Member Agencies that exceed their Tier 1 allocation during the calendar year will be billed at the end of the calendar year for the additional demand at the appropriate Tier 2 amount, depending upon actual Tier 2 costs incurred by TVMWD as a whole.

- **B. Groundwater Replenishment Water Rate.** MWD did not adopt a replenishment water rate for 2018 and beyond. Groundwater replenishment water is provided only when additional water for such use is available from MWD. Subject to any applicable legal restrictions, the General Manager may set a groundwater replenishment rate at his/her discretion for deliveries to non-Member Agencies as long as the amount is no less than the rates applicable to Member Agencies.
- C. In Lieu Water Rate. MWD did not adopt a replenishment water rate for 2018 and beyond, therefore an in lieu water rate has yet to be determined. As provided for in the section on replenishment service in the MWD Rate Structure Administrative Procedures Handbook, TVMWD will incorporate these procedures for the sale of available in-lieu water service. This water will be sold for the replenishment of water supplies in groundwater basins, as a substitute for deliveries from the Weymouth Treatment and Miramar Treatment facilities.
- **D. Untreated Water Rate.** Untreated water purchased from MWD for spreading purposes that is later extracted and sold will be charged at the current TVMWD rate on the date of extraction, less the initial price paid for the water. Effective January 1, 2018 the untreated rates from TVMWD will be \$695 per acre foot for Tier 1 and \$781 per acre foot for Tier 2. Additional charges based on the connection used and basin delivered to may apply. Subject to any applicable legal restrictions, the General Manager may set an untreated water rate at his/her discretion for deliveries to non-Member Agencies as long as the amount is no less than the rates applicable to Member Agencies.
- **E. Capacity Charge.** The MWD Capacity Charge ("Charge") will be \$8,700 per cubic foot second (cfs) effective January 1, 2018. TVMWD's Capacity Charge basis will be 152.8 based on TVMWD's peak connected capacity during the last three completed fiscal years. The Charge will either increase or decrease only if a new 24-hour peak demand is established during the period of May-September of any year. Subsequently, a revised Charge would become effective on January 1 of the following year. A monthly allocation Charge will apply to each Member Agency based on their specific non-coincidental peak during the period of 2014 to 2016, as follows:

As the cfs basis is subject to change each year, TVMWD will re-allocate the charge to each Member Agency for their proportionate share in setting the new peak. The monthly charge shall be paid regardless of the quantity of water delivered during the month and will be separate from the monthly water sale charges invoiced by TVMWD.

- 3. Penalties. In the event any Member Agency shall be delinquent in the payment for water delivered by TVMWD, or through an MWD connection, and/or other charges as invoiced by TVMWD, an additional charge equal to two (2) percent of such delinquent payment for each month or portion thereof that such payment remains delinquent shall be assessed, and the Member Agency shall pay such charge to TVMWD in addition to the amount of such delinquent payment. Notwithstanding the above, if the total period of delinquency does not exceed five (5) business days, the additional charge shall be equal to one (1) percent of such delinquent payment. In the event any Member Agency shall be delinquent for more than thirty (30) days in the payment for water, such delinquency shall be reported by the General Manager to the Board of Directors of TVMWD at its next meeting. The Board, in its discretion and upon such other conditions as it may prescribe after giving the Member Agency a reasonable opportunity to be heard, may order the termination of service to such Member Public Agency until all delinquent payments, including additional charges, are made to TVMWD or may authorize such other actions as may be legally available to effectuate collection.
- **4. Cost Allocations.** The required revenue for the TVMWD's FY 2017-18 Budget will be met in the following revenue priorities: (a) Miscellaneous revenues (interest, etc.); (b) State subventions; (c) TVMWD's Standby Charge; (d) Water Sales; and (e) Fixed Cost Allocations. The required calendar year Fixed Cost Allocation revenue of \$650,482 shall be obtained through three component allocations in equal amounts. Each allocated cost component will generate revenue of \$216,827. Each Member Agency has already submitted to TVMWD its certified component values.

- A. Connected Capacity Charge. Each Member Agency has the ability to receive water from TVMWD through service connections of TVMWD and/or MWD. The capacity of each service connection shall be determined and allocated to a Member Agency. The Member Agency's total allotment for the connected capacity charge shall be one-third (1/3) of the total required Cost Allocation revenue. The Connected Capacity Charge shall be collected on a monthly basis.
- **B. Equivalent Small Meter Charge.** All Member Agency revenue meters shall be converted to an equivalent number of 5/8" water meters using the AWWA conversion table found in the Service Meter Manual. The Member Agency's total allotment for the equivalent small meter charge shall be one-third (1/3) of the total required Cost Allocation revenue. The Equivalent Small Meter Charge shall be collected on a monthly basis.
- C. Historical Water Use Charge. TVMWD maintains the historical record of imported water use of each Member Agency. The moving three-year average total ending FY 2015-16 for the total use of all Member Agencies will be calculated. The Member Agency's percentage of the total three-year average water use shall be one-third (1/3) of the required Cost Allocation revenue. The Historical Use Charge shall be collected on a monthly basis.
- 5. Hydroelectric Rate. TVMWD also operates a hydroelectric facility at the Miramar plant. On an as available basis, the hydro provides power to the facilities through a separate meter. The actual power delivered through the Miramar hydro is received at the water treatment plant. The rate that TVMWD will charge for hydroelectric power will be equal to the melded aggregate average of the rate paid to Edison on the regular monthly bill.
- 6. Definitions. The definition and application of the foregoing classes and conditions of service shall be the same as those established, interpreted, and amended from time to time by MWD through its Administrative Code, and such other rules, regulations, policies, ordinances, or resolutions that have been or may be adopted by the MWD Board of Directors, which are by this reference incorporated herein and adopted by the TVMWD as though set forth herein in their entirety.
 - **A. Acre-foot.** The volume of water contained in one-acre area one foot deep. Approximately 435.6 ccf or 325,851 gallons.
 - **B. CCF.** The volume of water contained in one hundred cubic feet. Approximately 748 gallons.
 - **C. CFS.** A flow rate of one cubic foot of water per second. Approximately 448.8 gallons per minute.
 - **D. Groundwater Replenishment.** Water used for direct spreading by a Member Agency to meet the legal requirements of groundwater basin adjudication.

- **F. MWD.** MWD is a metropolitan water district organized and existing under the Metropolitan Water District Act of the State of California (Statutes 1969, Chapter 209, as amended).
- **G. Imported Water.** District water shall be comprised of water resources obtained from MWD, TVMWD's Miramar delivery, Member Agencies and other parties and/or produced and treated water by TVMWD from surface and groundwater resources. MWD Tier 1 and other supply charges are included in TVMWD's water charge.
- **7. General Manager Authority.** TVMWD's General Manager is hereby authorized to take any and all actions necessary to carry out the intent of the Board as is stated herein and as otherwise required in order to comply with applicable law.

Requested Action

Board approval of Resolution No. 17-04-798 Initiating Procedures to Fix, Adjust, Levy and Collect a Water Standby Charge for the 2017-18 tax year.

Discussion:

Attached is a proposed resolution to initiate procedures to fix, adjust, levy and collect a Water Standby Charge in the 2017-18 tax year. The rate and methodology for the standby charge are described in the draft Engineer's Report, which is available for review in the District office during regular business hours. If approved, the standby charge would be collected by Los Angeles County on property tax bills within TVMWD's service area. The charge is expected to generate \$3.4 million in revenue. The revenue will be applied to the MWD Readiness-To-Serve (RTS) charge of \$5.2 million for fiscal year 2017-18. The balance of the RTS charge will be paid with revenue from a separate MWD standby charge on property tax bills within TVMWD's service area. If the resolution is approved, the TVMWD Board will consider a resolution to adopt the TVMWD Standby Charge at its public hearing scheduled for June 21, 2017.

TVMWD first adopted a standby charge in 1996. If approved again this year, it will retain the same methodology used in 1996. For the 2017-18 tax year the proposed rate for a typical residential homeowner will be \$18.51 per equivalent dwelling unit.

RESOLUTION NO. 17-04-798 A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THREE VALLEYS MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT INITIATING PROCEDURES TO FIX, ADJUST, LEVY, AND COLLECT A WATER STANDBY CHARGE

WHEREAS, the Three Valleys Municipal Water District ("the District") is a municipal water district organized and operating pursuant to Water Code Section 71000 et seq.

WHEREAS, under the Uniform Standby Charges Procedures Act, Government Code Section 54984 et seq. ("the Act"), the District is authorized to fix before August 10 of any given year a water standby charge on land within its jurisdiction to which water service is made available for any purpose by the District, whether the water services are actually used or not.

WHEREAS, under the Act the Board may establish schedules varying the charge according to land uses, benefit derived or to be derived from the use, availability of facilities to provide water service, the degree of availability or quantity of the use of the water to the affected lands, and may restrict the assessment to one or more improvement districts or zones of benefit established within the jurisdiction of the District, and may impose the charge on an area, frontage, or parcel basis, or a combination thereof.

WHEREAS, on July 10, 1996, the District's Board of Directors adopted Resolution No. 7-96-361 which established a standby charge under the Act that was designed to fund the Readiness-to-Serve ("RTS") charge imposed upon the District by the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California ("MWD") and related administrative costs incurred by the District in connection therewith.

WHEREAS, Resolution No. 7-96-361 expressly provided that the District's standby charge was based upon the report of a qualified engineer which fixed that amount of the standby charge for the 1996-97 fiscal year at \$5.92 per equivalent dwelling unit ("EDU") and provided for the adjustment of that standby charge during subsequent fiscal years according to the actual amount by which the RTS charge increased, and subject to a maximum assessment amount of \$29.41 per EDU.

WHEREAS, Water Code Section 71639(b) authorizes the District to adjust the amount of its standby charge if the adjustment is made in the same manner as provided for taxes, fees, and charges in Government Code Section 53750(h)(2), which provides that a tax, fee, or charge is not deemed to be increased by an agency action that does either or both of the following: (A) adjusts the amount thereof in accordance with a schedule of adjustments adopted by the agency prior to November 6, 1996; or (B) implements or collects a previously approved tax, fee, or charge, so long as the rate is not increased beyond the level previously approved by the agency, and the methodology previously approved is not revised by the agency.

WHEREAS, Water Code Section 71639(c) further authorizes the District to adjust the amount of its standby charge if all of the following conditions are met: (1) the amount of the assessment does not exceed \$29.41 per EDU; (2) the revenue raised by the assessment, Resolution No. 17-04-798

including its annual adjustments, is used exclusively to fund the RTS charge, or equivalent charge, imposed upon the District by MWD, and related administrative costs; and (3) The District adjusts its water rates to its retail agencies by an amount necessary to prevent surplus funding of the RTS charge imposed upon the District by MWD.

WHEREAS, Water Code Section 71639(c) further provides that in order for the District to fix a standby charge pursuant to the Act, the District's Board of Directors must adopt a resolution to initiate such proceedings, cause notice of intent to adopt the assessment to be published in accordance with Government Code Section 6066 prior to the date set for adoption thereof, and, at the time and place set forth in said notice, conduct a hearing on the assessment and hear and consider any and all objections thereto.

NOW, THERFORE, the Board of Directors of the District does hereby find, resolve, determine, and order as follows:

- 1. The public interest and necessity requires the Board of Directors of the District to adopt this Resolution initiating proceedings to fix, levy, and collect standby charges pursuant to the Act in order to meet additional financial obligations imposed upon the District by MWD and all administrative costs related thereto.
- 2. The standby charge proposed to be adopted by the Board of Directors of the District is based upon the report of a qualified engineer, Willdan Financial Services, which is on file with the District, and available for review during regular business hours. The content of the Engineer's Report is incorporated herein in full by this reference, including, but not limited to, any and all statements and determinations specifically relating to each of the following:
 - a. A description of the charge and the method by which it is proposed to be imposed;
 - b. A compilation of the amount of the charge proposed for each parcel subject to the charge;
 - A statement of the methodology and rationale followed in determining the degree of benefit conferred by the service for which the proposed charge is made;
 - d. The District's legal ability to fix and adjust a standby charge, the amount of the proposed charge, and the properties affected thereby;
 - e. A description of the lands upon which the charge is proposed to be imposed; and
 - f. The amount of the proposed charge for each of the lands so described.
- 3. On June 21, 2017, at 8:00 a.m., at the District office located at 1021 East Miramar Avenue, Claremont, California, the Board of Directors will hold a public hearing to adopt the District's Standby Charge, which hearing shall be conducted in the manner set forth

in the Act. At the public hearing, the District's Board of Directors will vote to adopt the Standby Charge Resolution and will also consider whether to provide that if any charge so adopted becomes delinquent, the amount of the delinquency, together with any interest and penalties thereon, will constitute a lien on the affected property upon the filing of a certificate in the Office of the County Recorder, which lien may have the same force, effect, and priority as a judgment lien. At the hearing, the District's Board of Directors will hear and consider any and all objections or protests to the proposed charges pursuant to the requirements of the Act.

4. The District's General Manager is hereby authorized and directed to cause notice of the date, time, and place of the public hearing on the proposed charges to be duly published prior thereto as required by the Act and Water Code Section 71639(c).
